Student Right-to-Know Information on Graduation, Transfer-out, and Retention Rates

The following information is provided in compliance with federal regulations. The rates below reflect the graduation and transfer-out status of students who enrolled in 2013 and were tracked for three years.

During the fall semester of 2013, 1,651 first-time, full-time certificate or degree-seeking students entered Moraine Valley Community College. After three years (as of August 31, 2016):

- 27.8% had graduated from Moraine Valley
- 23.8% had transferred to another college without completing a degree
- 12.6% were still enrolled at Moraine Valley

Using the fall semester of 2013, 3,590 first-time students entered Moraine Valley Community College. After three years (as of August 31, 2016):

- 18.53% of Male students and 22.76% of female students received a degree or certificate.
- 19.25% of students who received Pell and 21.5% who received no Pell graduated with a degree or certificate.

Table 1 below shows the breakdown of those who received a degree or certificate by race:

While reviewing this information, please be aware that graduation rates are affected by a number of factors. Some students leave because their career goals changed and some leave when they get a job. Some may leave because of academic deficiencies. Some students begin full-time but are unable to continue attending full-time and thus need more than three years to graduate.

During the fall semester of 2015, 2,145 first-time, full-time students and 748 first-time, part-time students entered Moraine Valley Community College. After one year (as of fall 2016 end-of-term):

- 74% of first-time, full-time students returned to Moraine Valley
- 46% of first-time, part-time students returned to Moraine Valley
